Dear Friends of Sheltie Rescue,

I like to start out my Spring letter by telling you about how many sweet Shelties we helped in the prior year. Our number doubled over the prior two years with an intake of 30 Shelties. 11 were female, 19 male with an average age of 7 years. So far this year we've taken in 3 Shelties and all have been adopted. In our Special Needs program we are caring for 7 dogs: Bonnie, Boomer, Buddy, Gabby, Sequin, Snickers, and Teddy.

Our mission is clear: to accept every Sheltie in need, regardless of the history. We don't judge. We concentrate on their present and their future, not their past. We are often asked about the reasons for Shelties coming into our program. Here are a few of the most common reasons people cite for surrendering their Shelties:

- · Loss of home
- · Loss of job
- · Death in family
- · Illness in family
- · Financial limitations
- Medical issues of dog
- Behavior issues of dog

In addition to owner surrenders, we also work closely with shelters and other animal rescue groups. It's not uncommon to have a shelter notify us about a stray Sheltie, and we sometimes become aware of dogs through craigslist or social media. We have our 501 (c)(3) nonprofit information on file with many shelters and we are always quick to respond. One of our volunteers, Carolyn, is our internet "scout." She monitors a Northern California shelter database, receiving email notifications of any Shelties in shelters. We are then able to prevent Shelties from languishing in a stressful shelter environment.

You'll notice in the photo that Oakley recently joined our little family. He's a four-year-old goofy boy who came from a divorce situation. My twelve-year-old girl, Sierra, really took to Oakley while I was fostering him, so she convinced me that he needed to stay. Training is on the horizon to help smooth out a few rough edges, but he is definitely a keeper.

We are looking forward to our Annual Sheltie Celebration on Saturday, May 18th at Performance Dogs in Action in the Sacramento area. We always have such a great day spending time with other Sheltie lovers and their beautiful dogs. We hope to see you there! Wishing you lots of Sheltie kisses!

NorCal Sheltie Rescue's Special Needs program is dedicated to providing high-quality lives to dogs that require extensive medical care and attention. We are very proud of this program because we accept virtually all Shelties into our care. We are fortunate to have a few "permanent foster" volunteers who open their homes to "medically challenged" and senior dogs, commenting on how sweet they are and how grateful they seem. Right now we have **seven** Shelties in our special needs program: **Bonnie and Buddy, Gabby, Hershey and Snickers, Sequin, and Boomer.**

Snickers continues to need regular medical attention to keep his kidney and liver diseases in check, as well as his compromised gallbladder. "Dogs don't understand don't, because don't is a concept. Dogs understand DO. They understand behaviours.

Create a behaviour that you DO want, so that your dog can be right and you're setting him up for reinforcement.

This makes for a much better relationship for you and your dog, and for anybody else who comes in contact with your dog."

In mid-November, 2023, this duo came into NorCal Sheltie Rescue thanks to the outreach we received from the Front Street Animal Shelter in Sacramento. 
dogs.


